The Boston 'Free Speech' Rally: **Even Trump Liked It**

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The numbers said it all: 40,000 counter-protesters, 100 alt-right demonstrators, thousands of police and security forces, 33 arrests. On a warm Saturday afternoon, the Boston "Free Speech" rally became a happy celebration of just that, though it was clearly designed by the police and city authorities to prevent any direct confrontations with the altright advocates who sponsored the event. They were pretty much barricaded on the Parkman Bandstand on the Boston Common-seen some 100 feet away from the huge crowd that thronged the park to protest their presence, and not heard at all. Suppose you held a free speech protest in the park and no one could hear it? That is what happened on the Common on Saturday.

There was a scattering of confrontations between alt-right proponents and the protesters. One that I witnessed was a heated exchange

between a seemingly dumbstruck alt-right advocate and some angry protesters that admonished him. That the alt-right advocate was followed by a news reporter and camera made the moment seem less spontaneous than one staged for multiple

like, well, fake news. Who knows where the footage ended up? Brietbart, perhaps?

Otherwise it was an overwhelming expression of liberal politics with a definite anti-Trump stance. It brought to mind the much larger event that happened in the park on the Saturday after Trump's inauguration, when more than 100,000 came to the park to protest the President's election. It was more a love-in than the contentious event many expected to happen. Much of the credit is due the diligence of the police and the shrewd planning of city officials that mitigated any

friction. Butyou can'thelp but wonder why so

many of the alt-right didn't show up? Why the eventnever morphed into our greatest fears was due to the sheer one-sidedness of the crowd.

Even the President got it right in a confused set of tweets he sent out about Boston. At first he focused on the (few) confrontations between the police and protesters in his usual bluntmanner. Butsoon after (and one wonders if perhaps someone stole his smart phone) he tweeted praise for the marchers. In a dramatic turn, Trump went on to "applaud the many protestors in Boston who are speaking out against bigotry and hate. Our country will soon come together as one!" He also wrote: "Our great country has been divided for decades. Sometimes you need protest in order to heal, &we will heal, & be stronger than ever before!"

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Harriet Tubman: on the right side of history

Recent tragic events in Charlottesville involving white supremacists purportedly in anticipation of the removal of a statue of Confederate general Robert E. Lee; as well as debate in other cities and towns about the removal of statues that commemorate those individuals who fought in this nation's Civil War in the 1860's has received much media attention and focus.

The truth is that we are a deeply divided nation...in my opinion, it is only when we acknowledge and confront these realities that we as a nation can truly begin the journey towards real reconciliation and progress.

Boston, prior to, and during the Civil War was a center of abolitionist activity and there are numerous reminders of the sacrifices made by Boston citizens during the Civil War.

Among those are Doric Hall when you will leave the 1798 Bulfinch Front and enter the 1895 Brigham addition to the Massachusetts State House. The small hall contains a Daniel Chester French bronze statue of the Massachusetts Civil Warhero, William Francis Bartlett.

The next, larger room, built largely of Pavonazzo marble, is called Nurses' Hall because of the statue of an Army war nurse. Sculpted in 1914 by Bela Pratt, it was the first statue erected in honor of the women of the North after the Civil War.

Across from the State House is the Robert Gould Shaw Memorial by famed French sculpture Augustus Saint-Gaudens which commemorates the 54th Regiment Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry which was featured in the film "Glory". The infantry regiment in the Union Army during the American Civil War nicknamed the "Swamp Angels was one of the first official African-American units in the United States during the Civil War.

Lesser known to many Bostonians is a statue of another Civil War luminary. Located in a quaint park in Boston's historic South End neighborhood stands a 10-foot bronze statue of

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famed abolitionist and freedom fighter Harriet Tubman. Created by artist Fern Cunningham. The statue has the distinction of being the first on city-owned property to honor a woman; the park is also near the original location of the Harriet Tubman Settlement House which Tubman during her life allowed to bear her name.

Tubman's statue is depicted standing erect in front of a small group of tired and frightened looking people of African descent. Her expression is steadfast, resolute and unafraid. In one hand, she clutches a Bible as her other hand extends outward, pointing the way toward freedom. Also located in the park is a statue "Emancipation" created by acclaimed Harlem Renaissance sculpture Meta Vaux Warrick Fuller, commissioned by Massachusetts native son the great WEB DuBois to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the of Emancipation Proclamation by President Lincoln. The park also has the distinction of being the only park in the country with sculptures by African American female artists

'Mother Moses' - a name given to Tubman by famed Boston abolitionist William Lloyd Garrison (himself commemorated with a statue on the Commonwealth Mall) led many of her people out of bondage into freedom –was also a spy for the Union Army during the US Civil War.


New Orleans Mayor Mitch Landrieu stated in a speech entitled "The Cult of the Lost Cause" about the removal of Confederate statues in New Orleans:

"The Confederacy was on the wrong side of history and humanity. It sought to tear apart our nation and subjugate our fellow Americans to slavery. This is the history we should never forget and one that we should never again put on a pedestal to be revered".

So how is the Tubman statue different from those of Confederates who fought in the Civil War?

Tubman, who spent the first 28 years of her life enslaved on a Maryland plantation before escaping, and who risked her newfound freedom to liberate other enslaved people by following the North Star to many represents that which is at the core of Americas idealized American ideal, starting with the young nations War of Independence from Britain; and that is its rejection of an absolute and tyrannical monarch... and a quest for freedom.

The city of Boston in choosing to commemorate Harriet Tubman was on the right side of history as evidenced by its celebration of Harriet Tubman and all that her statue in Harriet Tubman Park represents and that is the concept of freedom and equality for all.



Harriet Tubman Park, South End, Boston

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
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
