Advice on Pets, Life, Love

Do dogs really improve your life? I hear that empty bromide all the time

but I can only think of life with a dog

Dear Dog Lady,

disease or die from any cause during the 12 years covered by the study," which was published in Scientific Reports.

Researchers explain that increased physical activity on the part of dog keepers contributes to better overall health. Also, the social interaction stemming from having a pet is very beneficial to mental and physical well-being.

Use a fraction of your joint income to hire a dog walker who can come in during the day and give all the dogs a walk and a potty break - such a good investment for every living reature. Dog Lady loves crates - and dogs love them too - but, still, asking a dog to stay cooped up for eight hours a day without a break is inhumane. They are dogs, not jail birds. Look for reputable walkers through referrals from neighborhood dog owners, your local pet store or veterinarian's office.

Also, when you and your fiance come in after a long day at work do not greet the dogs with loud drama. Go about your routines without a word. Let the pets out of their crates silently and matter-offactly. Later, you can greet them and mush on them. Remember, cranked up human behavior fires up canine engines. Keep it all low key and you won't be knocked over.



some Catholic churches and Hassidic study houses as they must have in his own time.

Now Huntington Theatre Company artistic director Peter DuBois is giving timely fresh expression to Moliere's cautionary play in an earnest and sometimes witty translation by Ranjit Bolt-complete with eight-syllable verse and some sharp rhyming.

While a partial updating of this sharp satire—with cellphone props, for example, and Anita Yavich's largely modern dress costume design—has its limitations, DuBois' tightropelike attempt to move between the age of Louis XIV and the present often succeeds.

While talented Alexander Dodge ("Present Laughter") bridgesvery different centuries with an elegant set that calls to mind 17th century legend King Louis XIV, Moliere's play depends most on the precarious relationship of Tartuffe and easily duped wealthy gentleman Orgon.

The opportunistic title character means to ingratiate himself with Orgon and eventually marry his daughter Mariane, whose heart belongs to her fiancé Valere. Although the play's first act speaks of a society where guests babble on at parties resembling Towers of Babylon, several members of Orgon's family are sawyenough to see through double-dealing Tartuffe where Orgon does not. The most formidable opponent, Orgon's second wife Elmire, fittingly prepares to outwit Tartuffe with a deception of her own, one that will expose him as a concealed Orgon watches. That

deception reveals Tartuffe's brazen readiness to violate such commandments as the injunctions against adultery, stealing and coveting.

Comedian Brett Celman, sporting a thick beard and often wearing a large black fez and matching black attire as Tartuffe, can seem like a cross between a Middle Eastern sage and a New Age guru. Celman may brandish a crucifix but sometimes suggests a Hassidic leader in his demeanor and gesturing.

Audience members may differ as to whether his Tartuffe is elusive enough as he fools Orgon. Still, his timing and physical comedy gifts do a lot to make his performance convincing. By contrast, strong Broadway veteran Frank Wood ("Clybourne Park," "Side Man") as Orgon has the right obstinacy defending Tartuffe but could do with more fire during his sillier moments. Talented choreographer Daniel Pelzig's (Huntington's earlier "Iolanthe") hand seems evident in Celman's dance-like capering around Orgon.

Pelzigalso enhances the moves of Orgon's blood relatives and in-laws as they react to Tartuffe, his ideas and his actions. The closing dance ensemble smartly contrasts with the opening stylized expository moves of the

Melissa Miller captures Elmire's tenacity in dealing with Tartuffe's duplicity. Matthew J. Harris has Elmire's brother Cleanthe's mix of acerbic observations and brotherly caring. Paula Plum is properly domineering and suspicious as Madame Pernelle, Orgon's mother. Jane Pftsch finds all of maid Dorine's perceptivity.

included San Francisco-based Amy Currin, head of development for the Rainbow Trust, Jack Antounian, founder of the Armenian Business Network, Middlesex County Sheriff Peter Koutoujian, state legislator David Muradian, local playwright Joyce Van Dyke, whose "Deported/A Dream Play" deals with the Armenian genocide, and public relations specialist Christopher Haynes of CBH Communications. With a matching donor, the benefit raised over \$15,000 according to Currin.

In his remarks, Antounian thanked the Festelijians for their ongoing support and for their hospitality in hosting the event and lauding the authenticity of the Festekjian's cuisine. "We're very proud of them," he said. Safe Steps for Karabakh was ABN's second annual Thanksgiving-week fundraiser.

"It was getting toward Thanksgiving, and we are all doing well, thank God, so how about giving thanks and thinking of others less fortunate than we are. This is going to continue every year," he explained. He also noted the value of the \$15,000 take in the target region.

"While \$15,000 might get us a moped or a motorcycle here, it goes a long way in Karabakh. Both Antounian and Currin talked about the devastating losses in Karabakh due to the landmines: human loss of life and limbs and loss of livestock, which is crucial to the residents both for food and for income.

"If you are in that region, the livelihood is cows, and they have been losing their cattle in that region." Currin explained that the Halo Trust, which was championed by the late Princess Diana and now by her son, Prince Harry, works in 23 countries around the world to clear landmines, which she described as "the deadly debris of war."

The Halo Trust is currently working on the "Landmine-Free 2025" initiative, which seeks to clear landmines from the most heavily impacted countries by the year 2025. Currin said that many landmine related accidents in Karabakh make it one of the deadliest places to live, "but the good news is we are 90 per cent there" in clearing the mines.

Currin quoted the warden of the forest in the village in Karabakh that is being helped as saying, "There is always fear of death with every step I take, but my mind has become accustomed to it." Currin added, "Your gifts are going to change that."

After all, clear video of an American sexual harasser at the highest level remains a source of contention for his trusting base. Even so, Moliere's play looks to a time when truth will overcome deception. If Huntington's "Tartuffe" is not a theatrical Paradise on earth, DuBois and company do make it both diverting and worthwhile.
