Boston has rolled back to a modified version of the "Phase 2 Step 2" of the state's economic reopening plan, effective now. Mayor Marty Walsh announced Monday afternoon in response to an ongoing surge in COVID-19 cases. Businesses such as museums, aquariums, bowling alleys, movie theaters, gyms and fitness centers are closed in the city. Indoor dining is allowed, with strict adherence to safety guidelines. Bar seating is restricted to those restaurants that obtain special permission from the city.

On Friday, we had a lot of people, and today, everyone who came in bought a ton of holiday stuff. Regardless of the cold weather, everyone was in the holiday spirit."

Gifted at 2 Dartmouth Street also did brisk business despite Saturday December 5's stormy weather, drawing shoppers of all ages to the family-friendly store. Manager Ioe Nadeau enlivened the atmosphere with the soundtrack from the "Pee-Wee's Playhouse" Christmas special featuring Grace Jones's rendition of "The Little Drummer Boy", and Gifted offered discounts during the stroll, with "a little more for healthcare workers and people in the medical industry," Nadeau said.

In addition to selling decorative household items, wearable accessories and books from across the US and around the world, Gifted is a purveyor of local author and historian Alison Barnet's "Once Upon a Neighborhood: A Timeline and Anecdotal History of the South End of Boston" and "Sitting Ducks", a crime novel based on a murder that occurred in one of Barnet's early South End residences.

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Man charged with home invasion on Chandler St.

Victim able to summon help via a 911 whisper

Boston Police report a man shoved into his Chandler Street apartment by some guy on at about 4:53 pm, on Saturday, December 5, was able to discreetly call up 911 on his phone and whisper for help.

Police report officers who arrived at the man's home, at the Columbus Avenue end of Chandler, shortly before 5 p.m. spotted the home invader walking out and immediately recognized him as somebody already wanted on numerous warrants.

The police report says: "Upon speaking with the officers, the suspect provided a name which they knew to be false. Officers detained the suspect on scene without incident and then made contact with the victim who stated that as he was entering his home, the male

suspect approached him from behind and shoved him to the floor of his foyer before locking the front door behind them. The suspect then forced the victim through the main interior door of his residence and into the living room area of the home. The victim stated that the suspect appeared distressed and agitated. After several tense moments, the victim was able to discreetly contact the Boston Police Department via his cell phone, speaking in a whispered tone to a 911 Dispatcher who was able to quickly ascertain the address and discern the seriousness of the unfolding incident, resulting in the officers' prompt response to the scene."

Police did not identify the suspect, but said he was wanted on 22 outstanding warrants in Boston, Somerville and Cambridge.

He was charged with assault and battery on a victim over 65, unarmed breaking and entering in the nighttime, disturbing the peace, disorderly conduct and providing a false name to a police officer, police say.

HOMELESS SERVICES AND HOS-PITAL CAPACITY

On April 2nd, Mayor Walsh announced that construction begins at the Boston Convention and Exhibition Center to add 500 beds for treating homeless adults who have tested positive for COVID-19 and need care, but do not require full hospitalization.

The City has released a Request for Proposals to secure a partner organization to operate the facility. If necessary, the Convention Center beds will be opened up for hospitals to use for sub-acute COVID patients in the general population.

These 500 beds will bring Boston's total number of new beds for homeless individuals to over 1,000. This includes Boston Medical Center's Newton Pavilion facility, which the City and State are working to re-purpose as a medical facility for homeless residents affected by the coronavirus.

SMALL BUSINESS SUPPORT

On April 2nd, Mayor Walsh announced two new resources that will help small businesses during the public health crisis.

The City of Boston has created a Small Business Relief Fund. Drawing on a combination of City, federal, and private industry contributions, it establishes \$2 million in grant funding-capable of providing a lifeline to hundreds of local businesses at risk of shutting down permanently due to the crisis. It will be administered as a streamlined version of the City's Small Business Financing program. Small businesses can begin applying on Monday, April 6.

The City of Boston has also created a Financial Relief Handbook and FAQ document for small businesses. It's a resource for navigating



has Today Show co-host Hoda Koib making introductions and briefly commenting about the ballet. At the same time, armchair narrator Colton Bradford of "Boston's The Hub" provides vocal program notes about 1820 young heroine Clara's dream and the title magical Christmas gift.

Koib's assistance is more of a mere network addition, while Bradford's narrative bits are likely to benefit young newcomers unfamiliar with Clara's workshop wizard godfather Drosselmeyer and the ballet itself.

Even in an excerpted form, company artistic director Mikko Nissinen's smart choreography is vividly evident. Paulo Arrais, arguably Boston Ballet's finest male principal, captures Drosselmeyer's elegance as well as his skill with the nutcracker itself at designer Robert Pertziola's sharply detailed workshop.

Mia Steedle has all of Clara's wonder and grace. (Missing in a broadcast also shortened by commercials is the heroine's envious sibling Fritz.)

Tigran Mkrtchyan catches the Nutcracker Prince's bravery in the amusing first act battle of cadets and mice. Closing the first act as always is the radiant snow scene, gorgeously lit by Mikki Kunttu. Here Paul Craig as Snow King pulls off strong high lifts with Seo Hye Han, who displays impressive leg extension as Snow Queen.

Once Clara arrives at the Palace, the congenial Sugar Plum Fairy and the Nutcracker Prince greet the dancers who will charm and amaze Clara and escorting Drosselmeyer. Boston Ballet fans will notice the absence here of such entertaining feats as the richly sensual Arabian and the acrobatically spirited Russian. Still, the pleasures of the remaining 'sweets' cannot be denied. Pertziola doubles as costumer throughout the ballet and especially at the Palace—most notably in the lively Spanish opener's fiery red outfits and the pastel poetry of the dancers in the Waltz of the Flowers. In the famed latter sequence, Viktorina Kapitonova combines rapid turns and lyrical entries and exits.

Mkrtchyan brings good length to the Prince's turns, and Ji Young Chae has the right lightness as well as speed during the Sugar Plum's pivotal solo. Their iconic pas de deux impresses with breathtaking lifts. Music director Mischa Santora and the Boston Ballet Orchestra do beautiful justice to the evocative Tchaikovsky score.

As always, Clara wonders whether everything was reality or dream. With COVID -19 vaccines now an approaching reality, Boston Ballet newcomers and aficionados alike can dream of the 2021 return of "The Nutcracker" in all its fully realized glory.
