



SPECIAL RECOGNITION

Sampson McCormick

It gives us great pleasure to honor Sampson McCormick with this Special Recognition Award. Sampson is a stand-up comedian, writer, lover of the theater, men, and black excellence. McCormick was born in Washington DC but currently resides in Los Angeles. He got his start in comedy at the age of 16. He has been featured on BET, TV One,



and VICELAND. In 2018 he made history as the first LGBTQ comic to perform at the National Museum of African American History and Culture in Washington, D.C. Mr. McCormick's body of works include an off-Broadway run of "BBoy Blues: The Stage Play," as well as films such as That Bitch Better Be Funny: Sampson Live at Howard Theater.

Did you know that Sampson recently wrote, directed and starred in a short film? A DIFFERENT DIRECTION is the story of Frankie Bailey, a black, gay man in his 30's struggling to make ends meet while being forced to confront one of the biggest challenges of his life.

Steven Fullwood

"Every time someone thanks you, it raises your vibration. I sparkle, I light, & I vibrate so high. Thank you, Philip, for this award. It means a great deal to me because it comes from my community. I vow to do the good work until I die, and then some."

Did you know that Steven once held a job as a children's librarian in his native Toledo, Ohio? "The job required me to think broadly about the needs of African-American children and to help their parents augment their children's education through books, film festivals, and other Black-focused programs, "he said.

His published works include *Black Gay Genius: Answering Joseph Beam's Call* (co-edited by Charles Stephens), 2014, *To Be Left with the Body*, (co-edited by Cheryl Clarke), 2008, and *Carry the Word: A Bibliography of Black LGBTQ Books* (co-edited by Lisa C. Moore), 2007.

OUTSTANDING SERVICE - FEMALE



Alexis Pauline Gumbs

Alexis Pauline Gumbs is a community cherished writer and Black feminist scholar. She was the first scholar to research in the papers of Audre Lorde at Spelman College and June Jordan at Harvard University, and her work to amplify the lessons of Black feminist writers is recognized around the world. Her work to create the Mobile Homecoming Living Library and Archive with her partner Sangodare is a model for Black LGBTQ

intergenerational engagement and care. She is the author of *Spill: Scenes of Black Feminist Fugitivity, M Archive: After the End of the World* which have transformed and enlivened Black feminist theory and poetics. Her co-edited volume *Revolutionary Mothering: Love on the Front Lines* offers an expansive vision of mothering as a transformative way of nurturing life, grounded in the leadership of Black lesbian feminist activists of the 1970s and 80s. She and her partner live in Durham, North Carolina where they are in the early stages of creating an intergenerational assisted and independent living community to celebrate and center Black LGBTQ brilliance.

Channyn Lynne Parker

Channyn Lynne Parker is a Transgender advocate, public speaker, community-centric leader and Manager of External Relations for Howard Brown Health Center. Prior to her current role, Channyn served as manager of The Broadway Youth Center's, Youth Youth Development Program, and manager of Chicago House Social Service Agency's, TransLife Project (2017).



Channyn, is the first openly transgender woman to work in the Cook County Dept. of Corrections, working with populations in protective custody. Inaugural Trans 100 awardee (2013). White House speaker, National HIV/AIDS Strategy (2015). Chicago Women's March speaker (2017, 2018). Recipient of the Henrietta Lacks award, Women in Health in Chicago (2018) and Equality Illinois prestigious, Freedom Award (2019).

Channyn, is quoted as saying, "Equality is the firmest pillar upon which human value stands. If I am named amongst those who are ambitious, and maybe even be crazy enough to believe that we, somehow through our actions can leave this world a better place. If I have played some small part in reducing the burden of injustice, then I have lived a life well served."

LaSaia Wade is an open Afro-Puerto Rican indigenous Trans Woman, founder of TNTJ Tennessee Trans Journey Project, and member of Chicago Trans Gender Nonconforming Collective and the Trans Liberation Collective, and Director of Brave Space Alliance. Recently,



she was honored at the Chicago LGBTQA Black History Recognitions ceremony and is the first Trans woman in Illinois History to be honored in Women's History month for the work she's doing not limited to community organizing. Her role in organizing ranges between and beyond as a central organizer for the Trans Liberation Protest Chicago, the largest march for trans rights in Midwestern history and being the Midwest Mother for the House of Ferré.

ARTISTIC EXPRESSION-SPOKEN WORD



SPECIAL RECOGNITION



Since 1972, the Gene Siskel Film Center of the School of the Art Institute of Chicago has presented critically acclaimed film programming annually with over 1,500 screenings and 200 filmmaker appearances to an audience that has grown to 100,000. The Film Center was renamed the Gene Siskel Film Center in 2000 after the late, nationally celebrated film critic, Gene Siskel. The Film Center's programming includes monthly series and annual film festivals like the Black Harvest Film Festival which will celebrate its 25th anniversary August 3-29, 2019. The Film Center's most vibrant annual showcase, Black Harvest is the Midwest's largest- and longest-running Black film festival featuring provocative films that tell stories, spark lively discussions, and address issues relating to the experiences from the African diaspora. Black Harvest features Chicago premieres, filmmaker appearances, panel discussions, and special events. Presented are over 50 features, documentaries, and shorts, including a number connected to Chicago, affirming the city's role as a vital center for independent filmmaking.
